




His kife Remembered

The late Dr. Imari Abubakari Obadele was born Richard Bullock Henry on May 2, 1930, the ninth of twelve siblings, to Walter and Vera Robinson Henry of Philadelphia, PA. He peacefully departed this life on January 18, 2010 in Mountain View Personal Care Home, Decatur, GA.





Imari accepted the LORD Jesus Christ at an early. Imari grew up in Philadelphia surrounded by a loving and supportive family. He was often referred to as "The Genius" because his academic excellence. Imari received his BA, MA and PhD from Temple University. He taught at Temple University and led the fight for better wages and benefits for Part-time professors and instructors. He held the position of professor at Prairie View A and M University in Texas. In 1952, he united in marriage with Octavia Young and they raised four children. They left Philadelphia and moved to Detroit Michigan. There they became more involved with helping Blacks achieve equal rights. Imari and his brother Milton became aquaintences of Malcolm X. In 1968 he organized The Malcolm X Society.

He lived a full and rich life and has traveled the World. His legacy is a gift to ALL who believe in equal human rights.

Imari leaves to mourn his loss, the mother of his children Octavia, Freddie, Vivian, Marilyn a.k.a. Malika, and Imari, nine grandchildren, numerous great grandchildren, four sisters, two brother-in laws, one brother and a host of cousins, nephews and nieces.
