## RESOLUTION NO. 2598

A RESOLUTION ENDORSING H.R. 40, INTRODUCED IN THE 108<sup>TH</sup> SESSION OF THE U.S. CONGRESS, AN ACT CITED AS "COMMISSION TO STUDY REPARATIONS PROPOSALS FOR AFRICAN-AMERICANS ACT"

1	WHEREAS, approximately 4,000,000 Africans and their descendants were enslaved in		
2	the United States and the colonies which became the United States from 1619 to 1865; and		
3	WHEREAS, the institution of slavery was constitutionally and statutorily sanctioned by		
4	the government of the United States from 1789 through 1865; and		
5	WHEREAS, the slavery that flourished in the United States constituted an immoral and		
6	inhumane deprivation of Africans' life, liberty, Africans' citizenship rights and cultural heritage,		
7	and denied them the fruit of their own labor; and		
8	WHEREAS, sufficient inquiry has not been made into the effects of the institution of		
9	slavery on living African-Americans and the society in the United States; and

11	through Public Law No. 100-383, the Civil Liberties Act of 1998, entitled "Restitution for World		
12	War II internment of Japanese-Americans and Aliens;" and		
13	WHEREAS, Italian-Americans have received consideration in Public Law No. 106-451,		
14	entitled "Wartime Violations of Italian-American Civil Liberties Act," which orders a report		
15	"detailing injustices suffered by Italian-Americans during World War II, and a formal		
16	acknowledgment of such injustices by the president; and		
17	WHEREAS, African-Americans have received from the U.S. Government and its		
18	predecessors, since at least 1619, only ongoing contempt and relentless racism; and		
19	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE		
20	CITY OF PINE BLUFF, ARKANSAS:		
21	Section 1. The U.S. Government should make a formal acknowledgment of the		
22	Holocaust of African captivity, enslavement and subsequent terrorism during a century of legally		
23	sanctioned Jim Crow.		
24	Section 2. The U.S. Government should make a formal apology for these crimes.		
25	Section 3. There should be a formal recognition of the horrors of slavery through		
26	monuments, education and other means.		

1	Section 4.	The U.S. Government should make restitution to living African-Americans	
2	for slavery and its	effects, as contemplated in H.R. 40, an Act cited as the "Commission to Study	
3	Reparation Proposa	als for African-Americans Act.".	
4	Section 5.	Measures to prevent a recurrence of the wrongful acts of the past should be	
5	adopted.		
6	Section 6.	The City Clerk shall promptly forward a copy of this Resolution to the	
7	following individuals and organization: (a) National Coalition of Blacks for Reparations in		
8	America, Post Office Box 42765, Philadelphia, PA 19101; (b) the Honorable John Conyers Jr.,		
9	United States Representative, U.S. House of Representatives, Washington, D.C. 20515; and (c)		
10	the Honorable Eddie Bernice Johnson, United States Representative, Chair, Congressional Black		
11	Caucus, U.S. Hous	se of Representatives, Washington, D.C. 20515.
